A Note from Administration Welcome back, BPA Riverview families! As we begin our MISSION this year, all things become POSSIBLE! A note for you:

Parents: there are many things we can do at home to help our children increase their vocabulary skills. Vocabulary goes beyond just knowing the meaning of a word. There are three critical areas of importance for the acquisition of vocabulary:

- Comprehension: This is the ultimate goal of reading. Having a robust vocabulary drastically improves your child's chances of success on any test.
- Currency: Words are the currency of communication. The more words you know, the better your communication with others will be.
- "Use your words"- Have you ever said this to your child? If so, perhaps the reason they have not "used their words" is because they have yet to acquire the necessary words needed to be able to use them. Enriching their vocabulary enriches their words, enabling them to better "use them."

To help your child enrich their vocabulary, start with their homework. Most of our teachers include a vocabulary list with their homework. Speak to your child about these words. Ask them if they can find their words while you grocery shop, or even when they are doing their nightly reading. Explain to them that sometimes one word means several things. When they say they recognize that word, ask them how. They may say "from t.v." That's the time to make sure the word they heard and the word they learned are one in the same.
