Welcome back, BPA Riverview families! As we begin our DREAM this year, and believe in it, all things become ACHIEVEABLE! Here are a few things you should know thus far:

Our theme this year is **Dream It**, **Believe It**, **Achieve It** and our teachers have a few dreams for the school year that they believe they can achieve!

Let's talk reading and reading platforms for a moment.

Reading:

Reading skills are a fundamental learning skill. Anything you give to your child that helps them improve their reading skills, helps them increase their chances of success in reading. The grocery list, typing an email to a relative, closed-captioning on a television show; even shows like Between the Lions, Reading Rainbow, and Sesame Street all focus on core reading skills.

Platforms:

- 1. I-Station: BPA requires 90 minutes of Reading (or more) per week.
- MyOn: Online library for students; Many teachers at BPA use this to help extend a lesson as well as issue assignments that can be done online.
- 3. Starfall: An excellent early-reader program that is free to use
- 4. Read to them: Priceless. 30 minutes a night. It is proven that parents who read to their children, strengthen their child's core reading skills.
- 5. Achieve 3000: program used in 2nd grade and up; It helps strengthen your child's literacy growth.
- 6. Libraries: Libraries may not be an option to visit in person now, but did you know all libraries are fully online now and have digital content available for check-out? They do and there is no replacement for your child's first library card. Online even has books that can be read to them (e-readers) as well!
- Let them read to you: Even at a young age, ask them to "tell you a story" based on the pictures they see. Never underestimate the imagination of a child.
- 8. Attendance: Remember, daily attendance helps improve student grades and your students' chance of success!

Communicate with their teachers through Dojo, agenda, or a phone call to let them know if your child will be late or absent. Call the school as well because this helps us keep accurate attendance records. Make attendance a **Dream** you **Believe** you can **Achieve**!

> Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15 to October 15, by celebrating the contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean , Central America , and South America.

The Hispanic Heritage observance began in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending on October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402.







Hispanic Heritage Month September 15-October 15








